“[B]ut in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect” (1 Peter 3:15)

Peter teaching the converted heathens as Luther says to be patient and kind. Patience and kindness can become in short supply—often. We might want to blame it on this or that situation, which is out of the normal, but never stop to think that is just life. Nothing normal to it. We go from one hard situation to another. From one trying time to another. In all of it, we are called as Christians to be patient and kind to our neighbors. We can be because Christ was patient and kind to us in our sin. Christ our Lord came and delivered us from our sins, dealt with us in love, patience, and kindness all the while still being reviled by the world and people He came to save.

This patience and kindness extend to when we are making a defense for our hope in the middle of abnormal situations that come up in life. It is during these times important topics tend to surface like an enemy submarine waiting to take a shot at us. We need to be ready as Paul tells Timothy, “...be ready in season and out of season” (2 Tim. 4:2) to defend our faith. The problem is found in the stressful, unusual, straining nature of the situation. When someone asks us about or challenges something, we believe we can become edgy and angry. Instead of answering them, we rebuke them chastising them for not understanding or having a lack of faith (in the instances of a fellow Christian). We are anything but gentle and respectful.

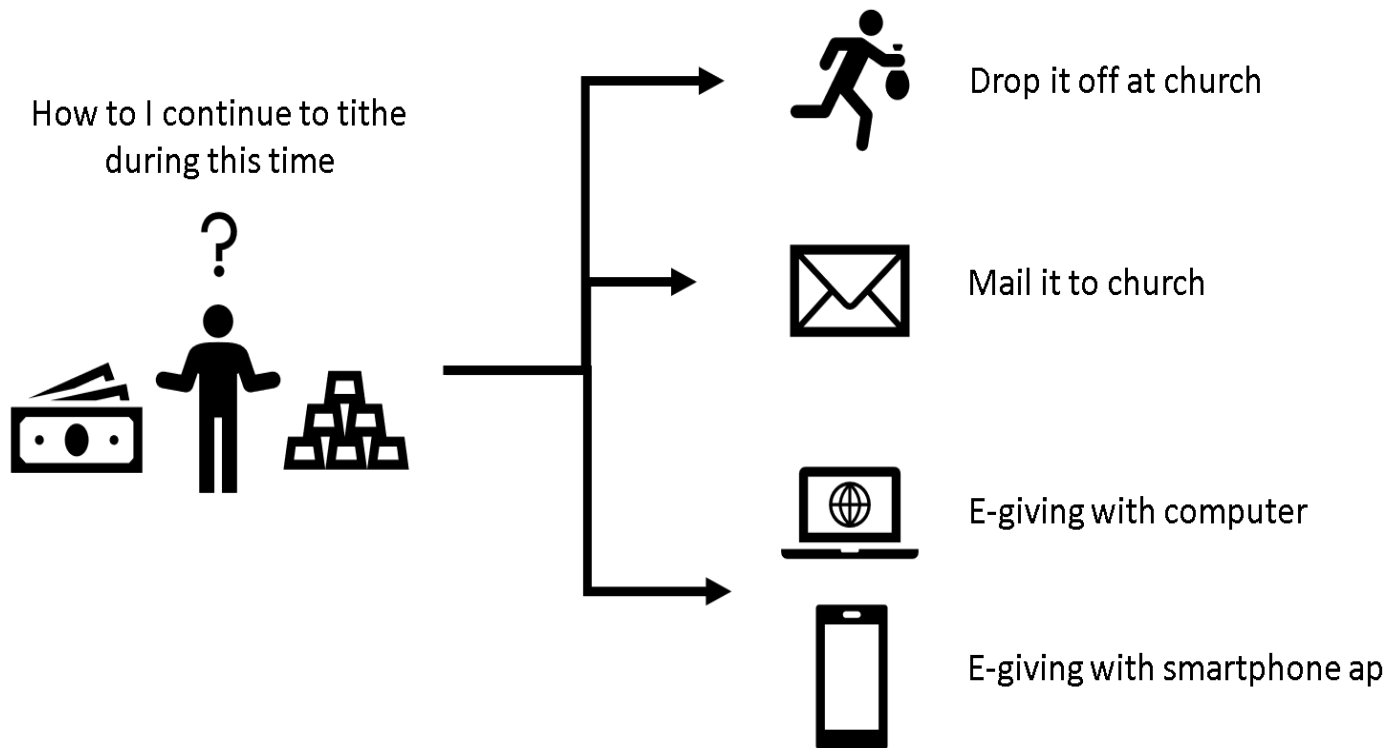
Gentleness and respect, we are called on to use when making a defense of our hope. These people who are challenging our beliefs are doing so because they are thinking about these topics. These submarines of topics have surfaced, and they are trying to deal with them. We are being given an opportunity to confess our faith and give them hope and comfort we have in Christ Jesus our Lord. Even if we are being attacked. Rude, mean, disrespectful, unkind language and actions will only cause the person to close their ears to you and no longer listen to what you have to say (by the way the only time you have done apologetics wrong is when the person won't talk to you any longer).

How do we keep calm and confess in the face of the anger and accusations which can be hurled at us? Answer. Remembering at the end of the day our hope is not in converting the person to Christianity but in Christ. Our future is already ours because Christ died on the cross and forgave our sins giving us eternal life. We face these people, we speak to these people, in the hope of eternal life. No matter the outcome of our conversation we still have eternal life. All we are doing is telling the person they have the same hope and joy in Christ Jesus that we have.

Pastor Welton opened the meeting with a prayer

Pastor discussed COVID-19 information and the church.

Shawn Martin read the letter put together by Pastor and the Elders.

Russ Mendel asked to add the mailing address for the church at the end of the letter.

The Council held discussions on the Financials of the Church. Church treasurer, Dave Beeck, mentioned all bills were current; there is \$1800.00 in the checking account and \$3000.00 will need to be paid by the end of the month. It was mentioned to use our "Thrivent Choice Dollars" towards our monthly bills instead of our "building funds".

There was also discussion on our church services going forward. A motion by Russ Mendel and a 2nd by Terry Reck to have no church services on Sunday, March 22; Wednesday, March 25 and Sunday, March 29. Motion passed.

Pastor Welton will discuss with the Elders on the continuation of Confirmation classes. Discussion will also take place with the parents of the Confirmation students.

Meeting adjourned at 20:35 pm (8:35 pm).

First Quarter 2020

April 16, 2020

We finished the first quarter with 5,955 in the general fund and 2,752 in the building fund. Our building loan at Thrivent is 13,363 and the furnace loan is 10,706; our loan principal was reduced 3,380 for the quarter. Our obligations are current at 3-31-20 with the exception of the social security offset to Pastor that is being delayed as his required first quarter estimate is not due until 7-15-20. Our Sunday School donations and designated funds amounts totaling 1,054 are normally sent in the Quarter after the donations; at this time, they have not been sent. Our general fund expense exceeded our general income by 4,100 for the quarter, this is similar to the activity we have seen in the first quarter in recent years. One unusual item to note is the Publications account listing an expense of 3,129; this includes 75 hymnals purchased for 2,236 and youth group study bibles for 695. A grant was received for 2,000 for the hymnals and is reported as general fund income.

Life Has Changed ...

Life as we know it has changed! The novel coronavirus (SARS-CoV-2), the cause of the disease COVID-19, has our lives in confusion, hysteria, and despair. Or does it?

The devil rejoices when Christians are separated from the gifts of God in Word and Sacrament. Governing authorities take precautions. The public welfare is considered, and policies are dictated. In Nebraska, the directive limits gathering in public events to 10 or fewer souls. How is the Church—your local church—going to continue? The norm of our weekly worship life is disrupted. Fear and uncertainty abound. Clergy, boards of elders, and church councils are sent scrambling for quick decisions. Strategies are discussed, alternatives are weighed, and announcements are published. The Word of the Lord shall endure!

In reality, life as we know it has not changed at all!

From the sin of Adam and Eve came the entrance of death into the Garden. For a time, it appeared the Serpent had won. Out of the despair of falling into sin and judgment came a promise.

"I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel" (Genesis 3:15).

God Himself has delivered on this promise. Salvation has come in a Son, conceived of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary.

"But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons" (Galatians 4:4-5).

Now we have received the gift of adoption into His Life at the cross of our redemption. Sins are forgiven as the Lord suffered the full wrath of the Father's judgment, drinking it down to the dregs. Dying, He lives! Resurrected to new life, He redeems us from sin, death, and the power of the devil. Raised in glory to the right hand of God, He bestows the power to become sons of the Father in our Baptisms.

"Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his" (Romans 6:3-5).

This is the life that we continue to live today, despite the struggles and tribulations that life in a sin-filled world continues throwing at us daily.

*Though devils all the world should fill, all eager to devour us,
We tremble not, we fear no ill; They shall not over-pow'r us.
This world's prince may still Scowl fierce as he will, He can harm us none.
He's judged; the deed is done; One little word can fell him."
(LSB 656, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God", vs. 3)*

Life, salvation, redemption, forgiveness, restoration, justification, sanctification, heaven—all little words that fell the devil. The greatest is “Jesus”! For He will save His people from their sins! This is the promise given so long ago and delivered to all believers. At the sound of Jesus’ voice calling us from the grave, we shall rise to the newness of life—created, redeemed, and called by God to be with Him forever in His heavenly reward.

Precautions and careful actions are indeed warranted. As Christians, we seek to serve our Lord by caring for the least of these. First, we care for our brothers and sisters in Christ. Then, we care by reaching out with Christ’s love and forgiveness to the world that awaits to hear His Word and believe. SARS-CoV-2 and the COVID-19 disease are serious. But life as we know it has not changed. It is still found only in the One Who gives us life—our Lord Jesus Christ.

For a time, prudent measures call us out of the comfort of our regular routine. A large Sunday Bible class followed by vibrant, choir-filled voices of worship and orderly procession to the Lord’s Supper may be curtailed momentarily. A temporary refrain indeed, but life goes on! The Word endures in your reading and family devotions. Your Baptism remains God’s gracious gift of adoption, never fading as you cling to the promises God spoke over you in His name.

Most likely, your pastor, the board of elders, the church council, as well as all your leadership and mission groups covet your prayers and continuing support. Remember the tithes and offerings. Even as you may not regularly attend due to required compliance with community guidelines and restrictions, the cost of maintaining buildings and supporting your shepherd(s) do not change. Ministries like Lutherans For Life will continue providing their service, even as conferences and workshops are being canceled or postponed. **Is it time to renew an annual membership that has possibly lapsed in ongoing support of the great work LFL remains vigilant to complete?**

Your neighbor needs not only your prayers, but maybe your help too. Look for ways to safely deliver groceries or medicines. Or is it possible to do light-duty cleaning or laundry for your elderly members? A call for conversation, a card of remembrance and prayer, an offer to drive them to a doctor’s appointment if needed—these are all ways to look after those vulnerable to this virus and disease. Look for ways you can share to be a brother or a sister in Christ in these trying times.

Jesus said, **“I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world”** (John 16:33). Sin continues to disrupt, and the effects of the fallen world continue to cause suffering. The devil continues to tempt us away from faith and trust in the work of God as we see this turmoil increasing. And Christ Jesus continues to deliver His followers out of all this world’s doom, gloom, and disease! Life—as we know it in Jesus—has not changed! Take heart, dear Christians! In Jesus there remains a peace beyond any worldly understanding. He has already overcome it all, for YOU!

May you remain strong and healthy in Christ Who sustains your peace, now and forever!

Our Savior calls us to follow Him in generosity. “For I have given you an example, that you also should do just as I have done to you.” (John 13:15) We cannot give our lives for the salvation of the world, of course. Praise God – that job’s already done!

But with hearts full of thanksgiving for what Jesus has given us, we can follow Jesus’ example of generous giving. And this is not merely an example alone. It’s also our Lord’s command. “The one who contributes, (let him give) in generosity.” (Rom. 12:8)

So, when we give to help others who are in need, and when we bring offerings to the Lord, we should strive to heed His command and follow the pattern He has established for us. Jesus did not give us leftovers. He gave His best. So, we should not give leftovers, either, but the first and best of what He has given us. Jesus did not give as an afterthought, but according to the plan of salvation God established from the foundation of the world.

So, when it comes to our offerings to the Lord, we should make a thoughtful plan to give generously, in proportion to the way He has blessed us. Like the Macedonian Christians, who gave according to their ability – and even beyond their ability (2 Cor. 8:3) – we can and should give a generous portion of the income that God provides us to honor the Lord.

So also, we should give freely, just as Jesus gave freely for us. There is no compulsion involved in our works of love and our offerings to the Lord. Nor do we give grudgingly. We should give freely and cheerfully because we want to out of thanksgiving. “Each as he purposes in his heart,” as the Lord says. (2 Cor. 9:7) There is no New Testament ceremonial law involved here. Rather, we are free to give as generously as our Savior has given for us.

In the same way, our Lord teaches us to give generously out of love – love for Him and for our neighbor. Genuine love is always love in deed (1 John 3:18), love such as Jesus showed us all. It is love that sees our neighbor in need and gives generously to help him. It is love that hears the Word of the Lord and does what it says. If we truly love, we give generously. If we give without love, our giving is not truly following Jesus.

Finally, we follow Jesus in generosity when we give for a good purpose to thank the Lord and support His gospel ministry and other works of mercy. The people of Israel gave generously for the service of God’s gospel purposes, to construct and support the operation of the tabernacle. For that was the place where the Lord received the Old Testament sacrifices, through which He bestowed the forgiveness of sins on His people. So, they gave abundantly – so abundantly that they had to be told to stop giving. (Ex. 36:5-6)

In the same way, we should bring generous offerings to support the Lord’s work of bestowing His gifts of forgiveness, life, and salvation in our congregations through the preaching and teaching of His Word, Baptism, and the Lord’s Supper. We should support the Lord’s work of caring for those who are poor and needy.

Our Savior calls us to follow His example in generous giving. Let us then, with thankful hearts, rededicate ourselves to following Him in generosity.

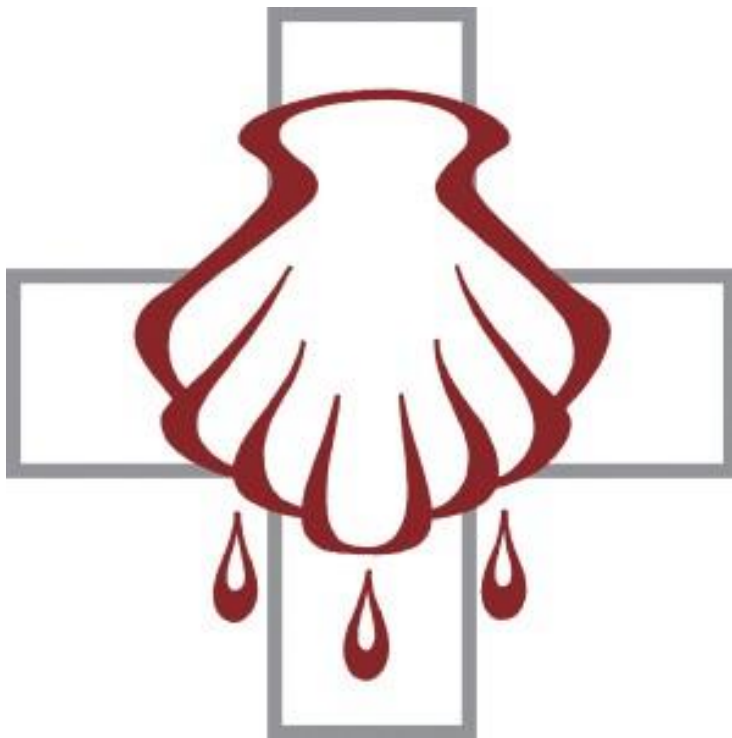

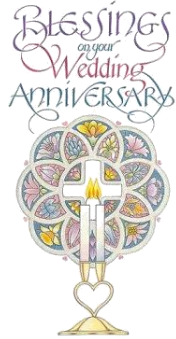
