Boring Laws No One Cares About

We all know the pain of having something we like, or love be vandalized or stolen. We learned that firsthand this month when our beloved church was vandalized. We thank God the damage was minimal and easy to take care. In these times it can be hard to not to be angry. But anger should not be the last word here. The last word comes from Christ when He says, "Father forgive them for they know not what they do" (Lk 23:34). In the death of Christ these vandals are forgiven and as the church we can speak this to them. They are forgiven. But does that mean we can live in lawlessness?

The answer of course is no. We or anyone is not allowed to live as if there is no law of God. As if there is no right and wrong, and no consequences for doing wrong. We are called by God to live according to His law and commands. That means we have to keep the seventh and eighth commandments. With the vandalism of the church, we can be tempted to want to talk, point fingers, and speak general ill of those who would do this to the church. We are commanded by God not to do this. We do not have to tell lies or cover up what has happened, but we are not to go and bad mouth the people even if we know who did it or don't know how did it. Our concern should be to make sure the church is protected and who ever did this that they would learn and not continue in a life of lawlessness.

As to the second really unrelated topic of the seventh commandment. Truthfully, talking about keeping the law just gave good reason to talk about this commandment. What I want to talk about is not the physical stealing of property but the intellectual stealing of property. Que the lawyer to come and tell us all about copyright law. While this may seem remote to the church we were impacted by it earlier this year. We were unable to use a hymn during service because we do not have the right copyright license to play it live on the internet. So, lets dive in a little deeper.

First, what is copyright law? "Copyright is the lawful right of an author, artist, composer or other creator to control the use of his or her work by others. Generally speaking, a copyrighted work may not be duplicated, disseminated, or appropriated by others without the creator's permission. The public display or performance of copyrighted works is similarly restricted" (https://ogc.harvard.edu/pages/copyright-and-fair-use accessed on 7/21/2021 at 1622). Here is what happened to us we were restricted from using the hymn because of the copyright owner would not allow us to perform the work online. We can run into problems if we copy material out to use it in Bible Studies, Sunday School, VBS, Newsletters, or bulletins without the proper permission. Unfortunately, these are all ways the church (here we mean the wider church around the world) breaks the seventh commandment all to often. We begin to think just because we are church these laws don't apply or the creators would be ok with it.

As the church needs to set the example for all people by not falling into this very tempting sin of simply taking what someone else has created and using it for our good without permission. Does that mean we can never use something someone else has created? No! We use many things other people have created. Just look at the hymnals and you will see all the hymns and liturgy are things other people have written and created. We use Sunday School material someone else created, and even Bible Studies and bulletin material. But we have permission to use them. When we purchase a hymnal Concordia Publishing House (CPH) gives us permission to use them in our public service and for our organists to play them. When we purchase Sunday School and VBS material we are given permission to us it. We also purchase a hymnal license every year giving us permission to reproduce the liturgies and hymns out of the LSB.

Along with this purchased permission there is what is called the fair use doctrine. Here the courts and now the law recognizes there are times when portions of a work are reproduced and it does not break the law. An excellent example is the quote from above. It has been cited and is used only a part of the work in an educational and non-profit setting. This means if there are articles, or parts of a book or a picture we want to use in Bible Study to some extent we can reproduce it without breaking the law, but we need to be careful. We need to be respectful of the original creator. Most of all we need to set an example of how to fulfill the seventh commandment for all people.

I know copyright law might not be your cup of tea and it is not my cup of tea, but we need to know it as individuals and the church. We want to be good examples to the members of the church and the world in knowing and following God's Law. We do this not to earn God's favor but as His adopted children we do what He tells us to do out of love for Him. These are the fruits of faith bearing out in our lives. Again, copyright law may not be the topic pick of newsletter article but it gives us a moment to pause and reflect on the seventh commandment and how we break it and how we can work towards keeping it.

When it comes to stewardship, a favorite Bible verse is the account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1–4). It's a moving account. Our Lord praises the seemingly small gift of two copper coins given by a poor widow above the abundance of gifts given by the rich, saying, "Truly, I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them" (Luke 21:3). And that is usually where we stop. But the text goes on. "For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on" (Luke 21:4).

"She ... put in all she had to live on." She gave everything. She held nothing back. She trusted that the Lord who made her and all creatures; who gave her everything she had; who redeemed her from her own sin, from death, and the power of the devil; who called her by the gospel and enlightened her with His gifts of Word and Sacrament; would continue to do this. He would provide her with all that she needed for this body and life because that is the character of the God she had.

But this is not why we give small gifts. Her gift, though it appeared small, was actually large. When we are tempted to give small gifts, it is precisely because we want them to be small! We don't trust the Lord to provide for us. We give small gifts because we lack faith in the One who created us, redeemed us, sanctifies and keeps us in the one true faith. We give small gifts because we doubt that God will really give us what we need and desire. We give small gifts because we are not content with what God has already given.

We are not slaves, children of the slave woman, under the Old Covenant (Galatians 4). We are adopted sons of the free woman. And since we are sons, we are also heirs. And heirs receive the inheritance. For everything is already ours in Christ. And thus, moved by the willing spirit of adoption, we do the will of God in financial matters far beyond all that done by those under the Old Covenant who were forced by legal demands.

So, what have you decided to give? How do I decide what to give? Let the Scriptures be your guide.

We are to give proportionally to what we have received from God's giving to us (Luke 12:48; 1 Corinthians 16:1–2, 2 Corinthians 8:12). But you have not been set free to give nothing. See that you excel in the grace of giving (2 Corinthians 8:7)!

We are not free to live selfishly outside the Gospel, without regard for God who gives us all good gifts, without generosity for our neighbor who needs us and our gifts, without supporting the community of faith in which we live, without care for our spiritual fathers and those who teach and help raise our children in the faith, and without resources for the poor and needy.

In short, we are not free to live unto ourselves, hoarding what God has given us only for us. For love is the fulfillment of the law (Romans 13:10). And the sum of the law is this: Love God and love your neighbor (Matthew 22:34–40). We love because He first loved us. We give because He has given to us.

Luther once said, "Possessions belong in your hands, not in your heart" (LW 14:240). There is a reason your 10 fingers spread apart. With your hands you catch God's gifts for what you need and let the rest fall through your fingers to your neighbors – your family, your friends, your community, your church.


