Credo: Redemption

We have talked about and answered the question of Jesus, "Who do you say I am?" Knowing the identity of Jesus is only part of what we need to know. The rest of what we need to know comes in the work of Jesus. The question would be 'What did Jesus do?' If we believe in Jesus to be true man and true God in the flesh we should want to know why He came into the flesh.

The answer is Redemption.

Redemption means the recovery of something lost. To understand the work of Christ we have to understand our current state. We are lost to God because of our sins. It is not that God has lost us, but that we have lost the ability to enter into the presence of God. More we no longer belonged to life but death. For this reason, we needed to be redeemed.

This redemption comes at a price. The price is so steep none of us can pay it. Even if we are to shed our blood for ourselves or others it is not enough to redeem us from slavery to sin and death. In short, we have nothing, not our wealth, not our health, not our life which is enough to redeem us from sin. We need something greater if we are going to be redeemed out of death and hell.

Here is where Christ comes into the picture. Christ can redeem you from sin and death. From the wrath of God because of your

sin. Christ lived the perfect life and now can pay the price for your sins and the sins of all people there on the cross when He dies. This leads us to the price of sin.

Luther in the Small Catechism writes, "[Jesus my Lord] who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death." It is not with earthly created things Jesus redeems the world from sin. It is not with the things the world finds to be valuable that Jesus redeems the world from sin. It is only with His blood that Jesus redeems the world from sin.

It is with His innocent suffering and death where His blood was shed that Jesus redeemed you and now has purchased you back from death to life. From sin to holiness. From eternal damnation to eternal life. Because Jesus has redeemed you with His blood you are no longer lost. You are no longer unable to enter into the holy presence of God. Instead, you are now a member of the kingdom of God, belonging to God, because He has purchased you with the blood of Christ.

This is the work of Christ. What we have just talked about is all wrapped up in the little word redemption. It sums up the work of Christ taking on flesh and blood in His birth by the Virgin Mary and then giving and shedding that blood on the cross. There Christ completed the work He was sent to do by the Father and you now live as one who belongs to God and has the hope and peace of eternal life.

Did You Know?

You may have seen the 1986 hit movie "Crocodile Dundee," but did you know that the main character may have been based on a Latvian? It is widely believed that the main character played by Australian actor Paul Hogan, was inspired by none other than Latvian born Arvīds Blūmentāls (or Crocodile Harry as he was known in Australia). Born in a small town near Rīga named Dundaga in 1925, Blūmentāls moved to Australia in 1951 and spent years hunting crocs in Oueensland. He would later remark that he had to leave Latvia due to the mass deportations enforced by the Soviets after World War II.



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Divine Service in English Comes to Rīga

On August 7, 2022, an important event took place at St. John's Lutheran Church in Old Town. Rīga. After a two-year hiatus, the Divine Service in English returned to that sacred space, a collaboration between Latvian Pastor Gints Graudinš and me. I. would like to thank Dr. Charles Cortright and Dr. John Bombaro (my predecessors in Rīga) for laying the foundation for the English service years ago. Unfortunately, the events surrounding the Covid-19 pandemic put an end to those efforts. Now that all of Latvia has opened up and tourism season is upon us, we thought it right to begin these services again.

purpose is to share the message of Jesus Christ to all the tourists and would-be English speakers in Rīga. Latvia. The English language has become a universal language of sorts the world over. With many tourists coming to see the sights of Rīga, we want to make the most of the opportunity to share the message of Jesus Christ.

I would like to thank Pastor Graudinš and the members of Rīgas Sv. Jāņa Baznīca (St. John Church of Rīga) for their willingness to partner with us in making this mission outreach opportunity a reality. Why Do Lutheran's Say "Divine Service"?

With the Divine Service in English starting up in Riga, I thought it fitting to write about why Lutherans use the term "Divine Service." Indeed, people will often use the term "worship" to describe what happens at church. The word itself is from the old English "worthship" which was used to ascribe true worth to something. In the case of God, the word would be used to ascribe true worth to God. Perhaps you can see the dilemma this word creates toward a Lutheran-biblical theology. First, who are we to attempt to ascribe "worth" to God? Second, the Bible states, "no one can say 'Jesus is Lord,' except by the Holy Spirit." (1 Cor. 12:3 ESV) Therefore, true worship cannot be offered unless God creates the faith in us to want to worship Him. Furthermore, God as God needs nothing from us including our

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worship. On the contrary, if we are to live, we need something from Him, namely His favor. And that's the purpose of the Divine Service.

The German word. Gottesdienst is translated literally as Divine Service. Likewise, the word liturgy, which is often referred to as synonym for Divine Service, comes from a Greek word for service. Notice the contrast between the words "worship" and "Divine Service." Whereas "worship" implies ascribing true worth to something or someone (our action) verses "Divine Service" which implies the Divine God serving someone (God's action). In this way, Divine Service works well with our Lutheran theology which states that, when it comes to salvation, we do nothing. God does everything!


And, of course, this is the purpose of the Divine Service. God comes to us through Word and Sacraments to serve us, just as He did by taking on our flesh, living a perfect life in our place, dying our death on the cross, rising on the third day and ascending into heaven where He rules all things for the good of His church.

In the Smalcald Articles (III, XII) of the Lutheran Confessions. Martin Luther wrote.

"Thank God, a seven-year-old child knows what the church is. namely holy believers and sheep who hear the voice of their Shepherd." I can't help but think Luther had John 10:27-28 in mind when he wrote this. There Jesus said, "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand." (ESV) Since we cannot go back in time to receive the gifts of the cross (i.e., forgiveness, life and salvation), God delivers the gifts of the cross to us through ordinary means. The Augsburg Confession (VII) defines the church as "the assembly of saints in which the Gospel is taught purely and the Sacraments are administered rightly." In other words, the church is defined as the place where God's people receive God's gifts through God's means of grace. The focus here being on God who comes to serve His people by forgiving their sins and giving everlasting life. This, then, is why we say "Divine Service".
