Credo: Descent into Hell

After Jesus had died on the cross it is common knowledge that He was buried. The tomb where Jesus was buried was close to Golgotha and was placed there on Friday when He died on the cross. This accomplished all of salvation, all of redemption, as we talked about last month. This month we want to focus on Christ's descent into hell and why Christ would do such a thing.

It is often thought this was part of the work of redemption. And that is a reasonable thought to have. To think that Christ would have to go and stay in hell in our place would fit in with Christ taking our punishment for sins. The problem is not that this explanation is sound reasoning but that it does not fit with what the Bible tells us is the reason for Christ's descent into hell.

"For Christ also suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, that he might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh but made alive in the spirit, in which he went and proclaimed to the spirits in prison" (1 Peter 3:18-19). Peter makes clear Jesus has suffered once for the unrighteous, for sinners and their sins and that this happened in the flesh. Meaning in his

earthly life Christ accomplished this work of salvation for all of us.

After accomplishing victory for all people on the cross Jesus descended into hell to proclaim that victory to the prisoners, to those who have rejected Him that they may know He was truly God and that God had kept His promise. It also told Satan and all of his angels (or we usually call them demons) that they had lost. In the moment they thought they had victory when Christ died was truly the moment of victory and now they are defeated. Now, they can be sure they have no hope.

That means you have hope. You have the assurance that the devil no matter how he might rage here on earth is defeated. He can only harass us in this life. When it is final time for us to move to the next life the devil will have no power. Think of the devil like a dog without teeth and on a leash. He can be frightening but in the end he is harmless because of Jesus.

The descent into hell is a doctrine a teaching of comfort for all Christians. It declares to us that Jesus has freed us all from being prisoners to sin, death, and the devil. We are now the heirs to heaven not the slaves of hell.

As we hear and confess of Jesus' descent into hell it comes as great comfort to all of us to know that Jesus has released us form sin and we are heaven bound in life and not death.

Wow! It's remarkable how different our second summer in Fort Wayne was than our first. Last summer involved a major move, hundreds of hours of Greek studies, learning to navigate a city larger than any we've lived in before, and making new friends (that last one was the best, of course). This summer was more about practicing some of my recently gained skills, exploring new destinations together as a family, and catching up with old friends.

The week after classes concluded, we made the trip to South Dakota for an extended visit. We started at Fairfax for Memorial Day, spending the week with family we hadn't seen in months. While in the area, Pamela took the opportunity to reconnect with her past LWML companions at the South Dakota state convention in early June.

On Pentecost, I had the privilege of preaching at our Brookings congregation, Mount Calvary. It was quite an experience to speak from the pulpit of the church that has been such an important part of our lives. That was just the first of my summer sermons. The next Sunday took us across the state to Rapid City where I was again honored with an invitation to preach at one of our previous congregations, Bethlehem. I dare say that even years from now, that sermon will remain one of Camden's favorites — my "Liar, liar, pants on fire!" sermon. While out west, we were able to experience the Badlands, Storybook Island, Dinosaur Hill, Bear Country, Custer State Park, Mount Rushmore, Sylvan Lake, and the Black Hills Dinosaur Museum. After playing the part of tourists for a few days, we spent another week on the farm, and I assisted with worship at Trinity in Fairfax on June 19. All along the way, we were able to visit with friends and thank sponsors for their support.

Finally, in late June, we headed back to Indiana just in time to pack and vacate our rental before the owners returned from their vicarage. We're grateful this was a short move and that our new residence is suiting us very nicely. We have a designated homeschool room for the first time ever, something we may never be able to live without again. We have easy access to miles of paved bike trails which lead to several playgrounds and sport areas. Perhaps best of all, Logan and Camden quickly made friends with neighboring kids and spend hours a week running back and forth between houses and yards.

On July 10, I covered a vacancy for a small congregation in Hartford City, IN, about an hour south of Fort Wayne. I led Matins, preached, and guided them through a section of a printed study on Romans. Although it was a low pressure situation, it was nonetheless interesting to be the man in charge, so to speak.

The next day we drove to Wisconsin Dells to meet up with my mom, sister, and her daughters for a couple days. As always, the boys had a blast with their cousins, and they got to try out some pretty awesome waterslides and rollercoasters. Back in Indiana, we enjoyed a free Tincaps baseball game, camping with our Trail Life troop, and hosting a few meals for seminary friends.

The last weekend of July we were on the road again, this time to Howard City, MI. We became acquainted with Rev. Townes of Bethel Lutheran Church through his family in Brookings and his association with Mount Calvary. We met him when he attended Symposia on campus in January, and he invited us up this summer so I could preach. He and his congregation were delightful hosts, and

we hope we will be able to visit again someday. On our way back, we stopped at the zoo in Grand Rapids and spent a day at Warren Dunes State Park along Lake Michigan. Climbing the 250-foot sand dune and jumping the waves was loads of fun!

We stayed closer to home for our final month of summer break, making just one day trip to Indianapolis. The outdoor exhibits at the children's museum there were closed when we first visited in November, so we tried again... in August...on a day when the heat index was 98! It was still a good time.

I preached my second sermon at Zion in August and began a Sunday morning study on Martin Luther's catechetical hymns. The opportunity to preach five times this summer and get feedback from pastors with different experiences and perspectives was immensely beneficial and excites me for Homiletics II this year and more preaching to come on vicarage.


